I. Call to Order & Record of Attendance	The meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Arthur Bracey, MD, Chair. It was noted that a quorum was present and the attendance was recorded. Dr. Bracey stated while some of Board members are in the room with us today, others will participate by videoconference as permissible by state law and the Harris Health Videoconferencing Policy. II. Public Comment	Dr. Bracey noted that there were no public speakers present.	
III. Legislative Updates	Mr. R. King Hillier, Vice President, Public Policy and Government Relations, led the discussion regarding pending state and federal legislative and policy issues impacting Harris Health System. He reported on the 340B Drug Pricing, Medicaid 1115 Waiver and Delivery System Reform Incentive Payment (DSRIP) Programs. Additionally, Mr. Hillier touched upon Indirect Medical Education (IME) funding, nursing educational training programs, state initiatives and bills for the current legislative session.	As Presented.
IV. Update Regarding Harris Health Strategic Facilities Plan and Financing	Ms. Maria Cowles, Senior Vice President, Chief of Staff, delivered a presentation regarding Harris Health's Strategic Facilities Plan and Financing. She shared the Lyndon B. Johnson (LBJ) Hospital facility expansion communication and bond referendum planning timeline as of February 1, 2023. She stated that early voting for the projected bond referendum begins October 23, 2023 through November 3, 2023. Election Day is November 7, 2023. Mr. Louis Smith, Senior Executive Vice President & Chief Operating Officer, provided an overview of Harris Health's strategic capital requirements and the System's current state of hospital facilities. He addressed the current and future orientation of Ben Taub (BT) and LBJ Hospitals as well as ambulatory care services (ACS) facilities. Ms. Victoria Nikitin, Executive Vice President, Chief Financial Officer, shared that the total strategic facilities plan will cost an estimated \$2.9B and will be completed in phases over the next 10+ years. These phases will be financed with \$2.5B in proposed bond debt proceeds, \$300M in Harris Health operating cash and \$100M in philanthropic contributions. Extensive committee discussions ensued regarding the localization of BT Hospital in the Texas Medical Center (TMC), geographic locations of Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs), and Harris Health's strategic approach and facilities financial plan. Introduction

Harris Health is requesting a voter referendum in November 2023 on a \$2.5B bond to fund its strategic facilities plan that is based on Harris Health System's 2021-2025 Strategic Plan.

November 2023 is the best time to seek voter approval because:

- This would be the only bond proposal on the ballot
- Infrastructure needs at LBJ, BT, and ACS are equally important and urgent

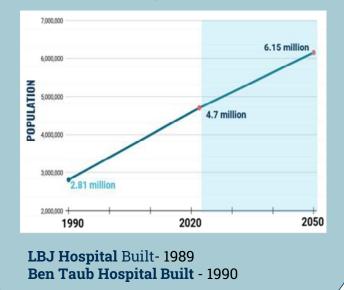

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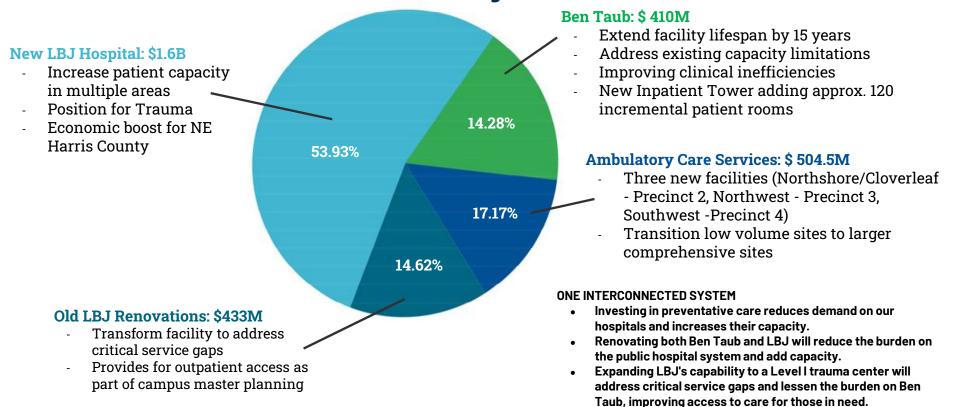

Harris Health plans to utilize bond debt proceeds in the amount of \$2.5B to finance the strategic facilities plan. Additional funding sources over the **NEXT 10 YEARS** include:

- Anticipated \$300M (total) in operational efficiencies/cost savings
- Anticipated \$100M (total) in grants and philanthropy

The Strategic Facilities plan is adaptable in the event the operating efficiencies/cost savings are not fully realized or philanthropic funds fall short of expectation.

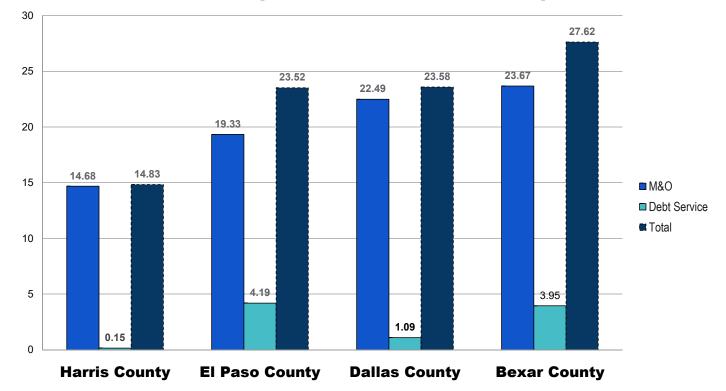
- Once the entire \$2.5 billion is financed over the next 10 years, the impact to the debt service rate will be 2 cents or less.
- For an average home owner (homes values at \$300,000) this impact equates to **less than \$6 per month**.
- This impact will not be fully realized until the entire \$2.5 billion has been financed, which will be not until a decade from now.

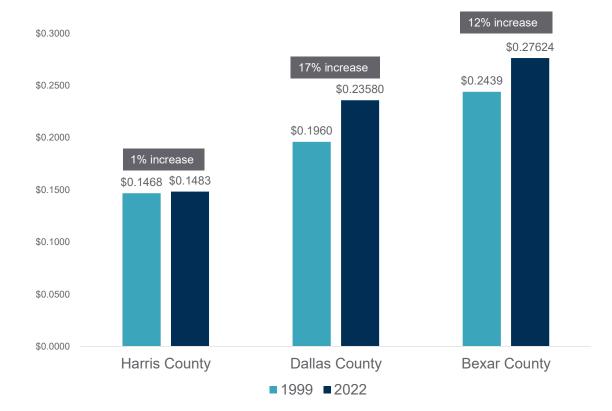

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Comparative Analysis of Texas Hospital District Tax Rates: 1999 Compared to 2022



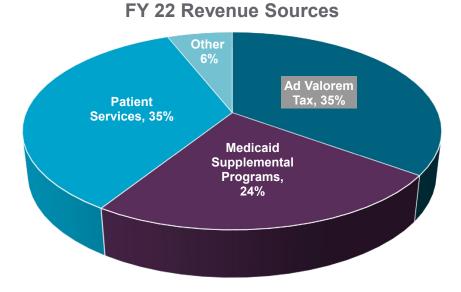

- No assumed significant changes to governmental payment programs without offsetting supplementation by other programs.
- No assumed major catastrophic events (e.g. COVID, Harvey, etc.).

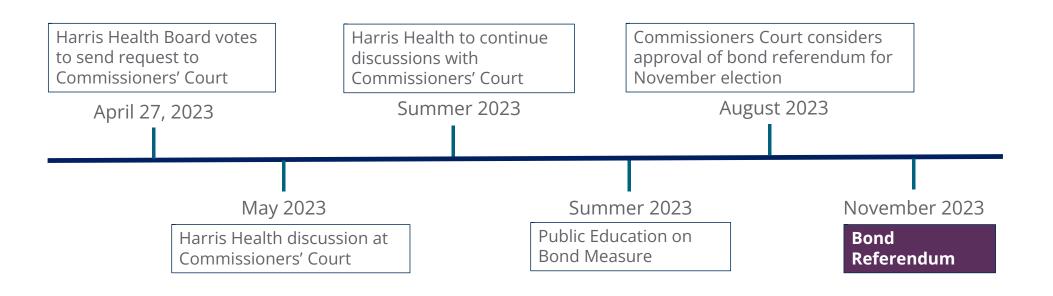
Impact on M&O Tax Rate

- Given the projected growth in the population of Harris County and the increase in the County's projected appraisal values over the next 10 years, Harris Health <u>does not currently anticipate a material increase in the future M&O tax rate</u>:
 - Based on Harris Health's current financial performance and known assumptions over the next 10 years, the M&O portion of the Ad Valorem tax support for the additional \$500M operational cost will be around \$175M (35%) annually.

While addressing the urgent and growing health care needs of our community, this plan does not anticipate an M&O tax rate increase.

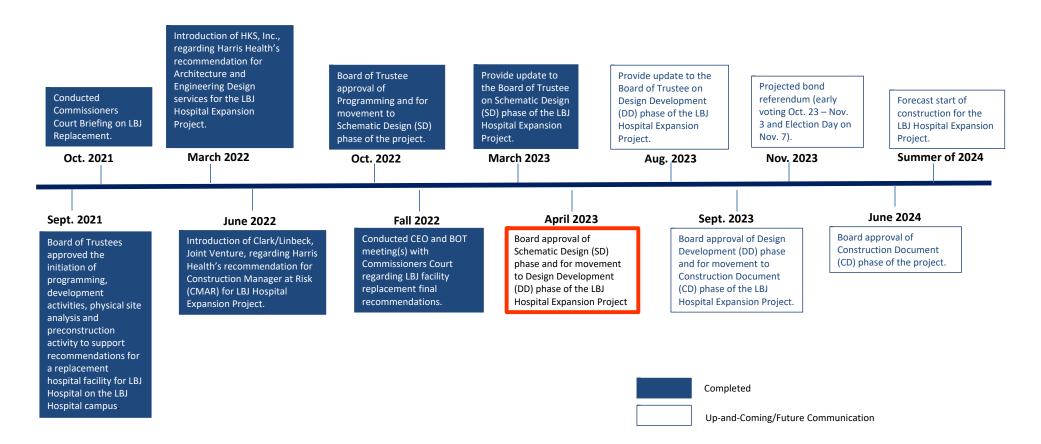

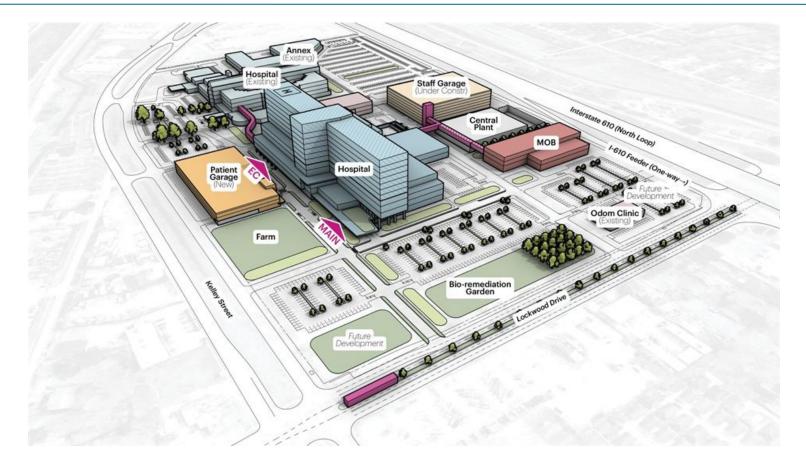

Stacking Diagram

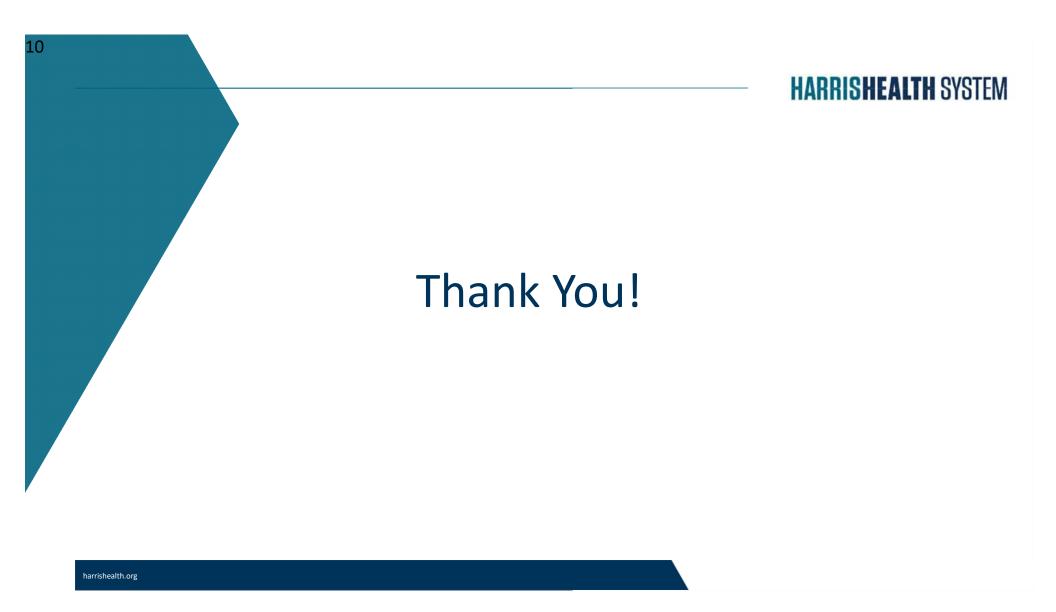

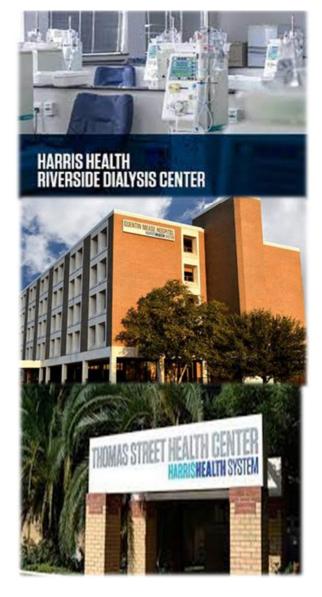

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Financial Highlights Review



As of February 28, 2023

Operating income for February was \$31.1 million compared to budgeted income of \$3.8 million.

Total net revenue for February of \$204.8 million was \$12.3 million or 6.4% more than budget. Net patient revenue was \$3.9 million lower than expected but was offset by improved investment returns of \$6.8 million. Medicaid Supplemental programs were \$7.6 million higher than budget primarily due to timing.

In February, total expenses of \$173.7 million were \$14.9 million or 7.9% less than budget. Staff costs were \$7.8 million under budget as a result of a reduction in contract labor utilization and lower salaries expense. Purchased services for medical insurance subsidies decreased \$3.3 million due to the Marketplace plan pricing effective for calendar year 2023. The change in the Community Health Choice plan pricing, and a corresponding decrease in subsidy, was discussed with the Board of Trustees in November 2022.

Also in February, total patient days and average daily census decreased 1.3% compared to budget. Inpatient case mix index, a measure of patient acuity, was 3.2% higher than planned with length of stay 1.4% lower than budget. Emergency room visits were 2.0% lower than planned for the month. Total clinic visits, including telehealth, were 6.6% higher compared to budget. Births were down 5.3% for the month but 13.5% higher year-to-date.

Total cash receipts for February were \$525.2 million. The System has \$1,546.0 million in unrestricted cash, cash equivalents and investments, representing 266.2 days cash on hand. Harris Health System has \$148.5 million in net accounts receivable, representing 74.8 days of outstanding patient accounts receivable at February 28, 2023. The February balance sheet reflects a combined net receivable position of \$235.1 million under the various Medicaid Supplemental programs.

Federal Update

MACPAC Annual DSH Analysis

In its <u>March 21 report to Congress</u>, the Medicaid and CHIP Payment and Access Commission (MACPAC) examines the relationship among Medicaid disproportionate share hospital (DSH) allotments, uncompensated care costs, and services for low-income, uninsured populations.

MACPAC found 27.2 million people were uninsured in 2021, decreasing 0.3 percent from 2020. This decrease likely is attributable to the continuous coverage requirements implemented during the COVID-19 public health emergency (PHE). The commission also found hospitals had \$41.9 billion in charity care and bad debt as reported on the fiscal year 2020 Medicare cost report — a 3.4 percent increase from the previous year.

The report reviews the effects of PHE policies, such as the Provider Relief Fund and other government appropriations, on hospital finances. Additionally, the commission includes state-specific projections of the Affordable Care Act–mandated Medicaid DSH allotment reductions, scheduled to take effect Oct. 1.

HHSC has formally submitted a request to CMS to utilize 2025 and not 2023 as a base year for purposes of sizing the Texas Medicaid Supplemental Payment UC pool directly related to the findings of this report. THA's letter to CMS supporting the HHSC request is attached.

<u>340B:</u>

Bipartisan sponsors in the House introduced legislation that would prohibit discriminatory practices by health insurers and pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs) against 340B Drug Pricing Program providers and their contract pharmacies.

On April 6, Reps. Dusty Johnson (R-S.D.) and Abigail Spanberger (D-Va.) introduced the <u>Preserving Rules Ordered for the Entities Covered Through (PROTECT) 340B Act</u>, which would prohibit insurers and PBMs from treating 340B providers differently regarding reimbursement of fees, participation in standard or preferred networks, or inventory management systems, and prevent them from interfering in a patient's choice to receive drugs from a 340B pharmacy.

The House Energy & Commerce Committee is unlikely to address 340B or the Pharma/NACH proposal which was reported on last month as they are currently operating in bipartisan

mode. However, it is possible that they will pursue some kind of reporting as part of a larger transparency package because the Administration requested it in the president's budget. Any movement on this issue presents another opportunity to codify the "Frontline" definition.

Medicaid DSH Cliff

The House Committee on Energy and Commerce Health Subcommittee is expected to hold a hearing the week of April 17 on the Health Resources and Services Administration and public health programs that are up for reauthorization this year. Committee staff has advised that legislation to address looming cuts to Medicaid disproportionate share hospital (DSH) payments might be considered at that time, though the hearing has yet to be officially scheduled. Rep. Dan Crenshaw (R-Texas) is expected to introduce a stand-alone Medicaid DSH bill.

A fight or prolonged debate over the DSH cliff appears unlikely, which is very good news. E&C is having a second hearing in a week or two, in where the DSH cliff will likely be raised.

State Update:

<u>CSSB 1275 - Hancock/CSHB 1962-Frank:</u> This legislation would bar the charging of a clinic visit fee for services rendered in the outpatient setting to compensate for the cost of operations. This bill would cost Harris Health \$35 million in lost revenue from Medicaid, Medicare and commercial insurance.

Concerns with new CSSB 1275:

- The bill prohibits a hospital for charging for <u>any</u> telemedicine <u>or</u> preventive service provided at <u>any</u> location on a hospital campus:
 - including inpatient care or
 - \circ at any outpatient clinic on the campus or off campus.
- Precluding care for inpatient care is not and should not be included in CSSB 1275.
- The definition of "services defined as preventive" under federal law is extremely broad as outlined below.
- CSSB 1275 is overly broad and could have ENORMOUS unintended consequences if passed.
- If HHSC is going to perform a study, the study should evaluate <u>all</u> delivery care methods.

Here is what is captured in the bill's definition of "preventive" per CMS:

Preventive Care for Adults

Abdominal aortic aneurysm one-time screening for men of specified ages who have ever smoked

Alcohol misuse screening and counseling

Aspirin use to prevent cardiovascular disease and colorectal cancer for adults 50 to 59 years with a high cardiovascular risk

Blood pressure screening

Cholesterol screening for adults of certain ages or at higher risk

Colorectal cancer screening for adults 45 to 75

Depression screening

Diabetes (Type 2) screening for adults 40 to 70 years who are overweight or obese

Diet counseling for adults at higher risk for chronic disease

Falls prevention (with exercise or physical therapy and vitamin D use) for adults 65 years and over, living in a community setting

Hepatitis B screening for people at high risk, including people from countries with 2% or more Hepatitis B prevalence, and U.S.-born people not vaccinated as infants and with at least one parent born in a region with 8% or more Hepatitis B prevalence.

Hepatitis C screening for adults age 18 to 79 years

HIV screening for everyone age 15 to 65, and other ages at increased risk

PrEP (pre-exposure prophylaxis) HIV prevention medication for HIV-negative adults at high risk for getting HIV through sex or injection drug use

Immunizations for adults — doses, recommended ages, and recommended populations vary:

Chickenpox (Varicella)

Diphtheria

Flu (influenza)

Hepatitis A

Hepatitis B

Human Papillomavirus (HPV)

Measles

Meningococcal

Mumps

Whooping Cough (Pertussis)

Pneumococcal

Rubella

Shingles

Tetanus

Lung cancer screening for adults 50 to 80 at high risk for lung cancer because they are heavy smokers or have quit in the past 15 years

Obesity screening and counseling

Sexually transmitted infection (STI) prevention counseling for adults at higher risk

Statin preventive medication for adults 40 to 75 at high risk

Syphilis screening for adults at higher risk

Tobacco use screening for all adults and cessation interventions for tobacco users

Tuberculosis screening for certain adults without symptoms at high risk

Preventive Care for Women:

Services for pregnant women or women who may become pregnant

Breastfeeding support and counseling from trained providers, and access to breastfeeding supplies, for pregnant and nursing women

Birth control: Food and Drug Administration-approved contraceptive methods, sterilization procedures, and patient education and counseling, as prescribed by a health care provider for women with reproductive capacity (not including abortifacient drugs). This does not apply to health plans sponsored by certain exempt "religious employers." Learn more about contraceptive coverage.

Folic acid supplements for women who may become pregnant

Nursing Workforce Shortage:

Senator Chuy Hinojosa filed SB 2059 – Grant Programs Established to Support Nursing Education and Training. He has also filed an exception item appropriation rider in Senate Finance to fund the program. The bill was heard in committee on April 13. This legislation helpsprograms retain their faculty and promotes the integration of both didactic and clinical curriculum. It would establish grant programs for clinical site nurse preceptor programs, innovative pilot programs and for part-time nurse faculty. Funding for these programs is included in the exceptional line item Article XI.

House Approves Budget: On April 6, the House approved a \$300 billion biennial budget. The Senate will take up HB 1 on April 17. A conference committee will then be appointed to finalize the budget.

Highlights of adopted riders in the House is attached.

Police Force Legislation Update:

Senator Borris Miles and Representative Jolanda Jones are the sponsors of this legislation. We expect House and Senate hearings on these bills later in April. We are also monitoring a number of workforce violence bills that are moving through both chambers.

Mandatory MCO Contracts:

SB 651 – Perry and HB 2401 – Chairman Oliverson filed the legislation that would repeal mandatory contracts for health plans owned by hospital districts. The House Bill was heard in the Human Services Committee earlier this month. The Senate Bill has not been heard in Senate Health and Human Services Committee. Negotiations continue with Chairman Frank and Chairman Oliverson in the House.

Texas Sues CMS Over Health Care Taxes Bulletin

The state of Texas has sued the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) in U.S. District Court in Tyler challenging CMS' Feb. 17 informational <u>bulletin</u> regarding health care-related taxes and hold harmless arrangements involving the redistribution of Medicaid payments.

The lawsuit, filed Wednesday, argues that the bulletin exceeds CMS' authority, was

noncompliant with public notice and comment requirements, is arbitrary and capricious, and attempts to implement with sub regulatory guidance policies CMS previously withdrew in the proposed Medicaid Fiscal Accountability Regulation, which were rejected in previous litigation over CMS rescinding Texas' Medicaid 1115 Transformation waiver. (The waiver was later reinstated and now is in place through September 2030.)

Texas asks the court to declare the bulletin unlawful and prevent CMS from enforcing it. The suit also asks the court to require ongoing audits of Texas' local provider participation funds by the federal Office of Inspector General to proceed without consideration of the bulletin. THA is monitoring the progress of the litigation.

Re: Amendment of the Texas Healthcare Transformation and Quality Improvement Program (THTQIP) Waiver

Dear Ms. Sankaran:

Texas Hospital Association supports the Texas Health and Human Services Commission's proposal to amend THTQIP STC 41(d) *Reassessment of Hospitals' Uncompensated Care in 2027*. The amendment would modify the year of Medicaid claims payment data used in the re-sizing from 2023 to 2025. We agree the use of claims and payment data affected by the ongoing federal public health emergency and continuous coverage period, which was not contemplated in the original waiver extension, could have unintended consequences on this exercise.

In FY 2023 to date, Texas is carrying about 2 million more Medicaid enrollees than in March 2020, when the Medicaid continuous coverage requirement took effect. We expect many of these enrollees would otherwise be uninsured if not for continuous coverage, which has prevented Texas from disenrolling those no longer meeting Medicaid eligibility criteria. Re-sizing the UC pool based on a year of abnormally high Medicaid enrollment and utilization may overstate expected Medicaid payments to hospitals, while understating expected costs of uncompensated charity care eligible for reimbursement from the UC pool. As a result, the available funding in the UC pool starting in FY 2027 would fall short of amounts needed to offset future uncompensated charity costs. The shortfall would persist through FY 2030, the end of the current THTQIP extension.

THA hopes this outcome can be avoided by changing the data year used in re-sizing to 2025. We appreciate HHSC anticipating and taking early action to address this issue and look forward to supporting the agency's request to CMS.

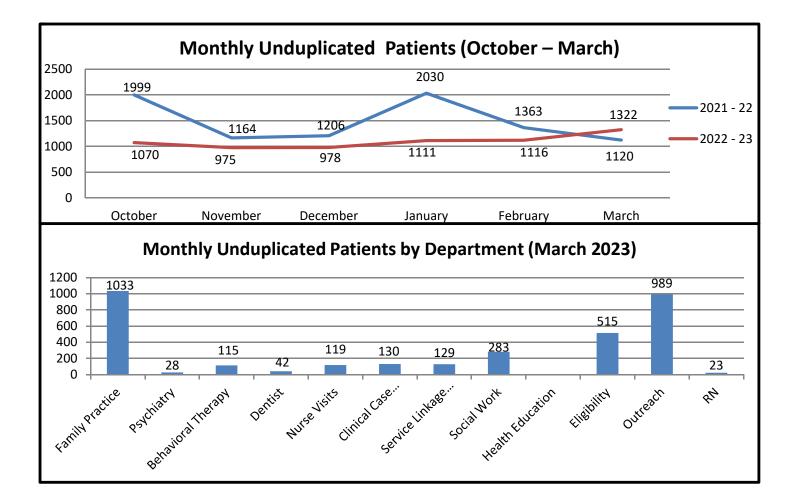

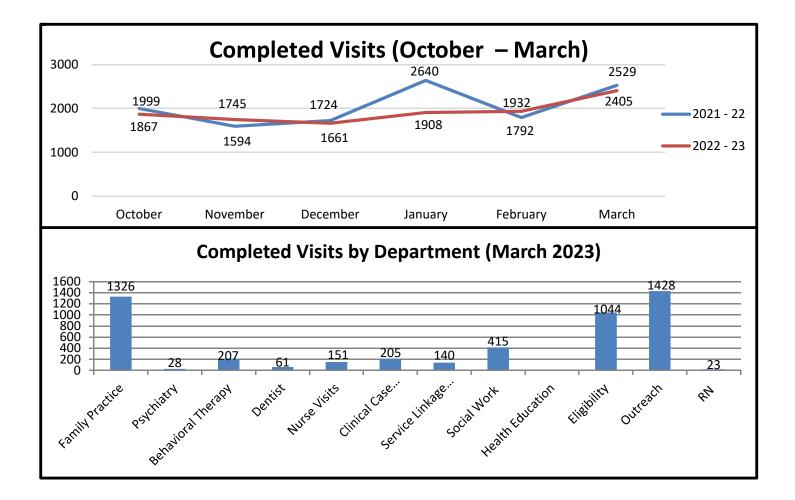

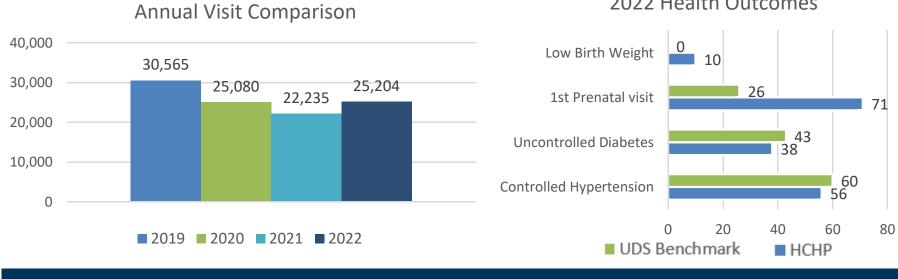

Service Area Analysis

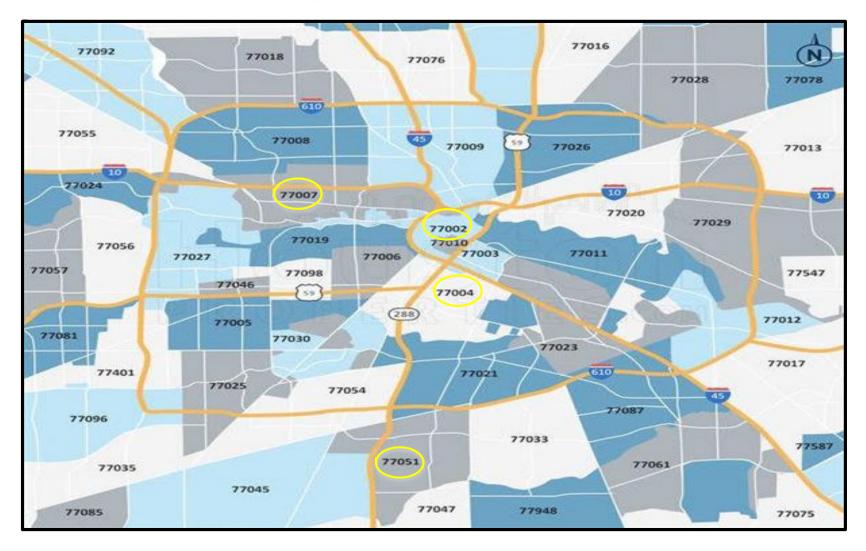

2022 Annual Progress Report to Harris Health System Board of Trustees

Executive Summary

As a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) funded by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), the Harris Health System Health Care for the Homeless Program (HCHP) is required to have a governing board that maintains appropriate authority and oversees the operations of the program. This annual report informs the board of program activities and accomplishments during 2022, including productivity, clinical outcomes, and a list of the sites where services are provided.

Highlights of 2022:

- From January 1, 2022 to December 31, 2022 the HCHP served 6,170 unduplicated persons experiencing homelessness compared to 4,174 in 2021 (see attached Comparison of 2019-2022 Uniform Data System {UDS} Reports). Due to a decrease in Covid-19 related clinic closures, there was a small increase in family practice visits. Mental health visits also increased with the addition of a 1 FTE Behavioral Health Therapist employed by Harris Health System. We saw a decrease in patient services in the areas of substance abuse and dental care. Substance abuse services provided by the Cenikor Foundation, decreased due to organizations high staffing turnover rate, which resulted in standardized processes being shared inconsistently with staff. Executive Leadership for Cenikor Foundation has developed an action plan to correct this deficiency with an education and training program on the appropriate documentation required for patients referred from the Health Care for the Homeless program. The decrease in dental visits for 2022 was attributed to the multiple repair issues on the mobile dental unit and the early termination of the dental contract by the vendor at the beginning of the year. A new contract was established with the University of Texas - School of Dentistry, which took six months to procure and execute.
- The patient cost measures continued to decrease from 2020 and continues to be markedly below the UDS average.
- HCHP completed the HRSA non-competing continuation grant application with no findings and secured renewed funding for the second year of the three-year grant period. The monetary award is \$4,412,560 for 2023.
- Provider productivity reports were analyzed monthly by the HCHP management team to determine whether resources should be reallocated within the direct care delivery system

- based on demand. This resulted in a reduction in days of operation of three shelter based locations. Corrective action plans were created for each provider as necessary.
- HCHP prepared and coordinated with various Harris Health departments in preparation for the 2023 HRSA operational site visit (OSV), resulting zero findings during the 2023 OSV visit.
- HCHP was awarded the HRSA American Rescue Plan Uniform Data System Patient-Level Submission (ARP-UDS+) grant for \$65,500 to improve data quality, aggregation, and analytic capacity to better facilitate UDS+ reporting.
- HCHP management met quarterly with shelter management to address productivity and performance improvement strategies.
- In addition to reporting to the Ambulatory Care Services Quality Review Council, HCHP also has a compliance and performance improvement committee that met monthly to address program and grant productivity and quality needs.
- HCHP management met monthly with the HCHP consumer advisory council.
- Recognized by HRSA with Community Health Quality Recognition Badges including: Health Center Quality Leader (top 20%), Advancing Health Information Technology for Quality, COVID-19 Public Health Champion, and Patient Centered Medical Home Recognition.
- The patient satisfaction average score for all sites was 76.1.
- HCHP received the Compassion in Our Community Award from Harmony House at the 2022 Home"less" for the Holidays Luncheon.

HARRISHEALTH SYSTEM

Harris Health System: A Public Healthcare Entity

Governed by Chapter 281 of the Texas Health and Safety Code and other laws applicable to hospital districts and hospital systems

Subject to laws applicable to governmental entities including the Texas Open Meetings Act (TOMA)

Created as unit of local government and a political subdivision of the State of Texas pursuant to the Texas Constitution, Article IX, Section 4 The Board of Trustees has responsibility for governance and oversight of the System. "Administrator" is responsible for operations.

Full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care to needy inhabitants of Harris County

Health System Board Responsibilities

QUALITY OF CARE

- Legal responsibility for the quality of the health care delivered.
- Board ensures effective systems exist for evaluating and improving the delivery of high quality care including regularly reviewing reports of quality indicators.
- Oversight over approval of medical staff bylaws, medical staff appointments and reappointments.

FINANCE

 The Board's duty is to provide financial oversight for the organization. Boards must protect and enhance organization's financial resources, and must ensure effective use of resources to achieve organizational goals.

COMPLIANCE

• The Board is responsible for ensuring that there is a strong and effective Compliance Plan.

CEO SELECTION & RETENTION

 The Board has a duty to select, oversee and evaluate a CEO who directs the affairs of the system effectively.

STRATEGIC PLANNING

 The Board must ensure that a strategic plan is in place and ensuring achievement of strategic direction.

SELF - GOVERNANCE

 The Board must create and maintain all the processes of self-governance and selfevaluation.

Health System Board Fiduciary Duties

Care	 Duty to faithfully execute the duties of the office, make informed decisions, and follow ethical and legal rules
Loyalty	 An absolute obligation to put the interests of Harris Health before direct or indirect personal interests;
Impartiality	 Duty to make decisions fairly and without regard to political party or affiliation

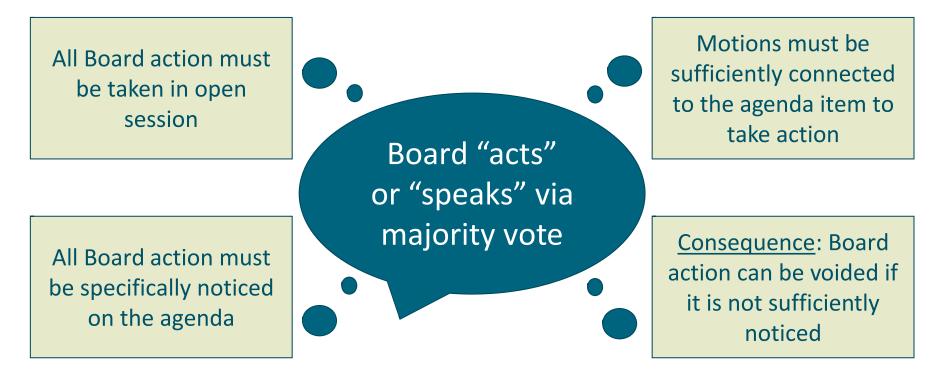

Executive Session (closed meeting)

Health and hospital systems have distinct executive session privileges due to the Board's responsibility over quality of care

• The purpose of the confidentiality and privileges of medical committees is to foster free exchange of information and protect the evaluative process, resulting in improved patient safety, health care quality, and outcomes.

Executive session only needs to be announced and identify the applicable section or sections of TOMA

No polling for votes can be done in executive session although Board members can express opinions



Certified agendas are prepared for the executive session items

Prohibited discussions:

A, B, C, D, and E go to dinner and discuss Harris Health business

"Reply all" to emails or texts



<u>quorum</u>:

Discussing Harris Health business in numbers less than a quorum for purposes of secret deliberations

A talks to B and C about Harris Health business; C then talks to D and E about what A, B, and C discussed

Consequence:

Criminal Misconduct, up to a \$500 fine, 6 months in jail
